Anke Boehme has been a Highgate resident for the past decade. A parent of two children attending St. Michaels Primary and Parliament Hill School, her daily routine includes walking and cycling school runs, allowing her to enjoy Haringey's beautiful urban fabric, while also recognizing areas for enhancement.
